

# Budget: Tough choices over cuts to revenue sharing hinder progress

## Lawmakers weigh in on deep cuts

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The State Journal spoke to mid-Michigan lawmakers Thursday, posing the following questions, as the Legislature continued negotiations for a budget ahead of a Thursday deadline. Cuts to K-12 education and the Michigan Promise scholarships were approved in bipartisan conference committees Wednesday; a bipartisan conference committee still is negotiating state revenue sharing for local communities and county governments.

### THE QUESTIONS

- **SCHOOLS:** Will you support the proposed cut of \$218 in per-pupil funding for K-12 education?
- **SCHOLARSHIPS:** Will you support the proposed elimination of \$120 million in funding for the Michigan Promise scholarship program?
- **REVENUE SHARING:** Would you support the approximately \$164 million in state revenue sharing funding cuts being reviewed by a bipartisan conference committee?

#### STATE SENATE

**SCHOOLS:** Yes. The state must consider deep cuts everywhere.

**SCHOLARSHIPS:** No. The state has made a commitment to tens of thousands of college students.

**REVENUE SHARING:** Yes. The size of deficit mandates it.

**SCHOOLS:** No. Schools are operating already at the margins.

**SCHOLARSHIPS:** No. The state needs to keep its promise to students.

The Promise Scholarship provides eligible students with a \$4,000 for college expenses.

School funding provides each school district with a minimum \$7,316 to \$12,324 in per pupil spending.
